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Student Conservation Association Joins Efforts in South Side Park

Since 1957, members of the Student Conservation Association (SCA) have been protecting and restoring national parks, marine sanctuaries, cultural landmarks, and community green spaces across the country. SCA's mission is to build the next generation of conservation leaders and inspire lifelong stewardship of our environment and communities by engaging young people in hands-on service to the land. Staff and crew members of SCA's Pittsburgh office are excited to do just that in South Side Park this season.

Thanks to the generous assistance of the Brashear Association, a crew of 12 young people, ages 14-18 and all from South Side's Hilltop neighborhoods, will be employed with the SCA in Pittsburgh and will focus specifically on conservation efforts in South Side Park during the spring of 2013. Some of their projects will include installing signage on unnamed and unmarked trails, performing maintenance work on those trails, removing detrimental invasive plants that threaten the park's ecosystem, and clearing litter and illegal dumping.

Every Thursday evening the crew will engage in a variety of environmental education, professional development, financial literacy, and job readiness

activities at the SCA office in downtown Pittsburgh. This combination of in-the-field work experience and educational activities will hopefully prepare these young South Siders to be lifelong stewards of community green spaces, wherever they decide to enjoy them!

The Cleanups and Safety Committee has a new chair, and will work on this effort as well as conduct regular cleanups throughout the year. And both Committees will use a new zone system that allows all parts of the Slopes to get some volunteer help.

Rebuilding Together Pittsburgh, a local nonprofit organization, delivers no-cost home repairs to qualifying low-income homeowners in Allegheny County.

A grant to The Brashear Association from the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development, UPMC Health Plan, Duquesne Light Company, American Eagle Outfitters, S&T Bank, and First National Bank for Rebuilding Together Pittsburgh will be providing their services to ten homes in the South Side Slopes and neighboring communities.

You may have already seen their team out on the streets in the Slopes. They have been knocking on doors, showing up at community meetings and stopping people on the street to provide program information to the community. They have even begun to assess the needs of a few homes through initial home inspections.

The repairs provided by volunteers and contractors can include the following:

- Window repairs/replacements
- Door repairs (i.e. locks, hinges, eliminating drafts)
- Wheelchair ramp installations
- Porch repairs
- Roof and gutter repairs
- Grab bar installations
- Handrail repairs
- Hot water/furnace repairs
- Patching walls and ceilings
- Painting walls and ceilings
- Caulking
- Insulation
- Landscaping

All applicants must meet the following requirements to qualify:

- Senior citizen (60 years or older), veteran, or permanent disability
- Homeowner and use home as primary residence for at least 3 years
- Current on all property taxes or on a qualified payment plan
- Low-Income household

With the goal of providing 10 homes with free repairs prior to June 30, 2013, the timeline is tight so apply today if you think you might qualify.

Good Things Happening in the Hilltop



The Hilltop Alliance is a community group consisting of representatives from Allentown CDC, Beltzhoover Civil Association, Carrick Community Council, Hilltop Economic Development Corporation, Mt. Oliver City/St. Clair Block Watch, Mt. Washington

CDC and the South Side Slopes Neighborhood Association

The mission statement is to bring together, serve as a resource, and promote a common vision within the hilltop neighborhoods.

The Alliance is currently working on major projects which include Fresh Fridays, Green Toolbox, code enforcement task force and a housing study plan in Beltzhoover and Allentown.

The Fresh Fridays project is distributing fruits and vegetables at St. John Vianney's church to neighbors from the 15203,15210,15211, and Carrick residents in 15227 zip codes that have household income at or below 150% of the poverty level.

The Green Toolbox is a neighborhood venture to improve green space, enhance tree and tree box sites on the roads in the districts. This also involves future plans to clean and green the hilltop.

The code enforcement plan is in its final stage of development and initial meetings with city officials have been set to begin work on the process. The housing plan in association with the Design Center is working on a comprehensive plan using hilltop wide housing data to affect a vision for the future of hilltop housing.

Even if you don't qualify based on income, all of the following conditions qualify you for Fresh Fridays on the Hilltop: receiving unemployment compensation, food stamps, cash assistance or medical assistance, SSI, or Social Security Disability. Also, those who are experiencing a crisis situation are always welcome. Produce to People and food pantry users are also welcome.

NOTE: 1 pick-up on each date per household

WHAT TO BRING: Proof of zip code residency such as rent receipt, utility bill receipt, mortgage payment receipt, valid state ID, or a valid driver's license. Please bring bags, boxes or rolling carts. They will not be provided for you.

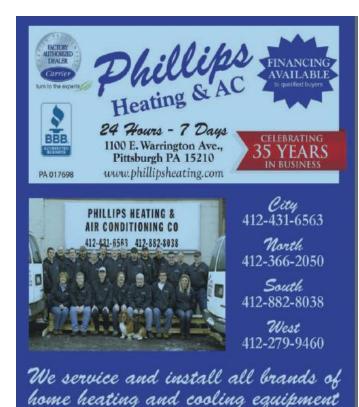
We soon will be launching a program designed at stopping littering before it occurs, but even with unprecedented success there is still an abundance that will need to be cleaned up.

- Michael Lamb addressed the recent reassessments of city properties and offered the help of his office to anyone who wants to appeal their assessment.
- Recent statistics for the police crackdown on Southside weekend visitors.
- Alert to neighbors of two recent break-ins at Slopes homes when their occupants were at work. Please keep eyes open and dial 911 immediately to report any suspicious activity.
- Board Secretary Jamin Bogi next reported on work of our Slopes Outreach Committee. The Slopes will be divided into six zones, each with a captain

- who will keep the Board appraised of any problems in the zone and will help with clean ups in their zone.
- Next General Meeting is on Tuesday, April 9th, at 7:00 PM in the Retreat Center, St. Paul's Monastery.
- On April 6th CMU students will help with either South Side Park clean-up or the Garden at the bend of S. 18th St. and Josephine St.
- Josh Nard of the Student Conservation Association will be working with twelve Hilltop students on Saturdays throughout the spring and summer in South Side Park. Projects include: clearing the trails, signage, litter cleanups, and invasive plant and vine removal. Josh also encouraged us to be a part of the Earth Day Event in the Park on April 20th. - Lindsay Ruprecht from Rebuilding Pittsburgh Together, a privately funded home improvement association which helps repair homes for elderly, people with handicaps and veterans is now looking at homes in the Slopes in need of repair. - Bruce Kraus talked about a soon to be approved e-waste plan for Pittsburgh. There will be more about this in the future.

City of Pittsburgh TRASH GUIDELINES

Each neighborhood is scheduled for collection on the same day every week.

Bulk waste (large items such as furniture and appliances) is now collected each week. Residents may place a maximum of two bulk items each week at curbside.

Recyclable items are picked up every other week.

What Refuse is Collected? Household trash

In addition to household refuse, crews will accept chairs, small TVs, bikes, small appliances, garden tools, end tables, ironing boards, roasters and grills.

Place all refuse at the designated site on collection day in plastic bags or bagged and placed into a container not exceeding 35 gallons in size.

Place needles, syringes and lancets in a hard plastic container with a tight-fitting plastic lid, labeled as medical waste.

Wrap sharp objects (broken glass/sharp metal) in heavy paper and place in a box reinforced with tape or string. Place animal feces and litter in double plastic bags and place outside the refuse container.

Where is Refuse Collected?

Curb side

CITY DOES NOT COLLECT carpeting installed by a professional, construction, building, explosive, medical, hazardous, infectious or flammable materials as well as car and automobile parts, bricks, cement, glass blocks, or marble or stone countertops.

When is Refuse Collected?

Weekly pick up

Place at curb no earlier than 7 p.m. on the night before collection and no later than 6 a.m. on the day of collection.

Prohibited Materials: Propane tanks, smoke detectors and chemicals are some examples of prohibited materials. For information on disposing of these and other materials which may be hazardous, please call Environmental Services at 412-255-2773.
